2009-2011 BIENNIAL BUDGET

PRINCIPLES

Recognizing that the State's budget is a moral statement, WSSC's advocacy efforts prioritize attending to the needs of the poorest and most vulnerable persons in our society. We seek budget choices, both in revenue decisions and expenditure decisions that focus on the common good.

The 2009 Legislature and the Governor must enact a balanced budget for the next two state fiscal years. Washington's fiscal situation has been negatively affected both by the national and state economic downturn. Despite a healthy reserve fund, the legislature still will face a sizeable deficit in the general fund in the 2009 legislative session. The latest revenue forecast and the predictions from the economists at the Office of Financial Management place the deficit at about \$5.1 billion. The 2007-2009 Washington State's biennial budget is \$33.6 billion. The deficit is a revenue problem, based on the combination of a long-term structural problem and a weak economy.

The deficit's impact on human services could be severe. More than 50% of general fund state appropriations are dedicated to education. Human services make up approximately 35% of the budget. The majority of those funds are spent on health care and corrections. The potential for cuts in human services is significant, especially for immigrants and state funded social programs.

The capital budget will also be negatively impacted by the reduced revenue forecasts. The Housing Trust Fund (HTF) is part of the capital budget, which provides funding for low-income housing. The HTF is an integral part of nearly all affordable housing developments in the state. Since its creation in 1988, the HTF has been the foundation of more than 32,000 affordable and supportive housing units, including farmworker housing. Each of the (Arch)diocesan housing authorities use the HTF as part of their funding sources.
